



Food Insecurity







^{*} Food Insecurity status was measured using the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Six-Item Short Form of the Food Security Survey Module.



Housing Insecurity & Homelessness





Highest Rates of Affirmative Responses to Housing Insecurity Items (past 12 months):

- Doubled up or shared a room (38% De Anza; 26% Foothill)
- Moved in with a people due of inarcal problems (31% De Anza, 20% Footbill)

- Did no know v program you were to sleep, even for one night (11% De Anza; 3% reachill)
- Didn't have a home
 (10% De Anza; 5% Foothill)

What students said


I used to qualify for free lunch and breakfast at school. This comprised most of my calories for those years... Access to healthy food is a big deal to poor students.


