- x W20 course succe \$2%) and retention (91%) rates are similar to W19. Like W19, African American, Filipinx and Latinx W20 course success rates trails the college rate. Their success rate gap of 2 to 15 percentage points in W20 is similar to their gaps in W19
- x In W20, most of the course withdrawals are from tinx (32%), followed by Asian (23%) and White (23%) students Combined, the proportion of African American, Filipinx, and Latinx students who withdrew in W20 is 46% compared to 48% in W19.

x Chart 1 provides the ethnic distribution of students who withdrew from ter classes Most of the W20 withdrawals consist Latinx (32%), followed by Asians (23%) and Whites (23%). 


Chart 1: Ehnic Distribution of Students who Withdrew 19 vs. W20


