RE: Program Review Nisory Counci Survey Results

## Overview

A survey invitation was sent todaisory Council membersh (proting and non-voting) who would have attended the Program Review presentations on May 7/4 and 12, 2021 Twelve respondents, representing studen faculty, classified staff, and administrators responded to the survey out of a possible 2 for a response rate of 4/4. Responses to all survey questions are included at the end of the memo.

## Highlights

- x More than half of respondents (58%) indicated the program review presentations were "very successfulin creating a fown half space to learn about program.
- x Almost half of respondents (42%) indicattenat the program review presentations were "very successfulin allowing Advisory Council to give feedback to programs.
- x Three-fourths of respondents(75%) indicated that the program review presentations were "very successfulor "moderately successful creating a culture of continuous improvement at the college.
- x Two-thirds of respondents(66%) indicated that the program review presentations were "very successful'or "moderately successfuln revealing commo trends across programs.
- x Respondents noted that program review presentations fill a role of having public discourse on the program reviews and "provide a profound way to share and get to know aboutother programs on campus"
- x Respondents continue to be less clear about the purpose of program review presentations As one respondent commented, don't understand the goals and outcomes of these presentations ts seemed more like a cheerleading is than really taking a close look at the program for with two than I didn'really see a look at common trends across programs.
- x Respondents suggested addipnogram awardsensuring programs understood their data; and following up on programs with limited/low enrollme (with possible next steps) as components receiving more focus in future program review cycles.




