## Overview

Students who registered for Non-Credit Parenting (NCP) courses in 2015 Winter and Spring terms were identified to determine their course enrollment patterns (refer to the Methodology section for sections included). There were 449 students enrolled in at least one NCP course in 2015, making up for an enrollment of 672. Table 1 shows that over one-third of NCP students enrolled in at least two NCP courses in 2014 (36%). Less than 1% of NCP students enrolled in a credit course during the same time period.

Table 9 shows that the educational level among the majority of NCP students is unknown (64%); in fact, almost two-thirds are considered special admit. Approximately one-third of NCP students either earned a HS diploma or equivalent (19%) or at least a bachelor's degree (13%).
